Pastor's Message

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" 2 Corinthians 5:17

Dear Friends,

Every year, a Jewish friend of mine sends a Happy New Year's card, and in it she writes her hopes for me in the coming year. That's when I take the time to wonder what the new year will bring. We often think of January 1 as a new beginning—a new year with a clean slate upon which to draw our lives—to imagine what can be. It's the perfect time to hit pause and reflect on what was and the possibilities to come. Why not allow our imaginations to run wild with wonder and curiosity—just as they did when we were children?

Actually, new beginnings are happening all the time—if we pause long enough to take notice. Each

year, each month, each day, each moment can be a new beginning if we shift our perspective from taking things for granted to living with curiosity, wonder, and gratitude. However, we don't always welcome new beginnings because it can mean a painful change in our life. It can mean being challenged in ways we'd rather resist. It can mean being called forth from our comfort zone and away from the patterns of living we have gotten used to. Whether we embrace or greet a new beginning kicking and screaming—they come. God has a way of drawing us into new beginnings whether we choose them or not.

When we are drawn forth into a new beginning, how can we prepare our hearts and minds for it? How can we lean into it and find the trust and courage that God knows what God is doing? How do we come 'round right to find joy and delight in stepping into the risk of a new beginning?

Perhaps you know some of the answers from your lived experiences. If so, I offer John O'Donohue's gorgeous poem, "For a New Beginning" (See next page). In it you might recognize how you have encountered a new beginning with trepidation and angst and how you eventually allowed yourself to "unfurl into the grace of beginning."

May your new beginnings—whenever and however they happen—be sacred and holy moments in which you allow yourself to be carried by God's eternal love for you.



The Thrift Shop Celebrates its 60th year Anniversary, October 22nd, 2023

This year we have been celebrating sixty years of our very successful Thrift Shop!



At our October general meeting we enjoyed a sit down dinner, provided by the church, to honor our volunteers. The meal was cooked by Carolee Packard and served to us by Carolee and Rosanne Amaru. Joyce Bock talked about the history of the thrift shop and Joyce Kenneally presented a scrapbook she made of past event. These two women spent many hours going through the archives to compile this information.

"The North Falmouth Congregational Church Thrift Shop turned 60 years old this year and on Sunday, October 22^{nd} , a dinner was held at the church to honor the thrift store's twenty volunteers. During the event, a history of the shop compiled by Joyce Bock and a scrapbook compiled by Joyce Kenneally were shared with the group.

In 1963 a group of North Falmouth women met and founded the *What-So-Ever Club*, a hybrid of a social club and church committee. The name came from a quote in *Philippians 4:8*, which was interpreted as whatever needs to be done, we will do it. One of the group's priorities was to start a thrift shop. It began in the church cellar. In 1965 the women purchased the small house at 149 Old Main Road next to the church for \$10,000 and quickly set up shop. Opening it for business in the spring of 1966, the group was able to pay off the mortgage in 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. The shop has been a success since the

day it opened, considered by many, the group said, as "the best boutique in town".

But the *What-So-Ever Club* volunteers did much more than just run a thrift shop. Over the years they supported many of the church's outreach endeavors. Not only did they support local needs like when a family lost everything in a fire, they also supported an orphanage in Vietnam during the war there and sent money to people left homeless after an earthquake in Italy in 1980."



In November, the Thrift Shop had a successful two day Christmas sale in the Covenant Room. We tried something new by starting the sale for two hours on Friday evening with takeout lobster rolls. The doors were open again on Saturday from nine until noon. Our net profit was \$1700.




