A Letter from Pastor Christina & Rev Dr. Claire Bamberg

Dear Friends.

What is God calling and gifting us to do now? This is one of the questions that is before us as we stand on the threshold of discerning together what God is calling our church to do and be in this hurting world. Rev. Dr. Claire Bamberg joined us earlier this month to support us in taking the first steps to reflect on our hopes, dreams, and vision for our church.

This process is much like gardening, we decide on what seeds we want to plant, then we till the soil and add what is needed to nurture growth. After sowing our seeds, we wait. This is an active waiting of tending, weeding, watering, and praying for the sunlight (and the rain). When the time is right, we reap the harvest and enjoy the fruits of our labors. Because we do not get to plan the "rightness" of the timing, the wait can seem impossibly long. In the rest that follows the harvest, we contemplate what grew well, what did not, and what new seeds we want to plant next.

With Claire's guidance they are listening, being thoughtful, discerning what seeds need to be planted and nurtured now, and acting prayerfully on those ideas.

One way for us to nurture and tend to their leadership is to have a commissioning service to recognize their ministry to the church. On November 12, we will gather during worship to affirm their gifts and passions, anoint and lay hands on them, and ask that God's blessing to be upon them as they lead us in this holy work.

Be watchful—the seeds are being planted! And remember, no change is too small to build momentum under and with God.



Upper Cape Chaplaincy Supported by NFCC Outreach

Who is there to support you emotionally and spiritually when tragically you are at Falmouth Hospital as a patient? The chaplains of the Upper Cape Chaplaincy are there to provide quality professional chaplaincy services. They also provide services to JML Care Center.

Upper Cape Chaplaincy board of directors is made up of 13 Upper Cape houses of worship of which NFCC is a member. The 3 board members from NFCC are Kristin Fraser, Joyce Kenneally and Marsha Martin. As a board we are responsible to hire qualified clergy who visit nearly 17,000 patients and residents each year. During the COVID pandemic and continuing today, the chaplains also provide emotional support to the hospital and care center staff who work tirelessly to provide good medical care.

The organization employs five part-time clergy, one of which is Rev. Saramaria Allenby. They divide up the hours needed to meet the spiritual and emotional needs of patients, families, and staff.

As Cape Cod Health Care has found it necessary to decrease funding for the much-needed services of our chaplains to patients, families and staff, the Upper Cape Chaplaincy has had to backfill the void left by the hospital system. Each church, as a member of the Upper Cape Chaplaincy, provides funding through its Outreach program which is appreciated. However, it is not enough the cover the pastoral support needed. The board works tirelessly on applying for grants, fundraising and other projects to meet the yearly budget.

On Thursday, October 5th we sponsored a "Dining for a Cause!" event at the Stir Crazy Cambodian restaurant on MacArthur Blvd, in Pocasset from 3 PM to 8:30 PM with 20% of each meal being donated to Upper Cape Chaplaincy. The owner is a generous young man, and Joyce, Kristin and I thank all who participated in this worthy cause.




