### **UPCOMING WORSHIP – LENT & EASTER**

### February 26 – 10 a.m. – Who Will You Listen To?

Seeking the fruit of the garden, Adam and Eve allow the snake's manipulative voice to become louder than God's voice. In the wilderness, Jesus defies the deception of the tempter by listening intuitively—to God, to his inner moral compass, to the teachings of his faith. Who will you listen to? Whose voices—and what messages—take up too much space in your head? **Scripture:** Matthew 4:1-11 | Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7

### March 5 – 10 a.m. – How Do We Begin Again?

While Pastor Christina is away, Rev. Heidi Champagne will be leading worship.
Nicodemus comes to Jesus under the veil of night to ask him big faith questions. Jesus invites him to begin again, to learn a new way of knowing and living out his faith. In Genesis, God commands Abram and Sarai to leave everything to seek the land of Canaan and begin again. Like Nicodemus, what are the questions we ask in the dark? Like Abram and Sarai, how do we follow God's calling to begin again? **Scripture:** John 3:1-17 | Genesis 12:1-4a

## March 12 – 10 a.m. – Will You Give Me a Drink? | Communion Sunday

Jesus seeks out a Samaritan woman drawing water from a well. His command to her is also a question and an invitation into a new way of life: "Will you give me a drink?" Her answers allow Jesus to see the woman fully; she leaves transformed. The Israelites ask: "Will you give us a drink, God? Will you take care of us, even now?" When we are at the well or in the wilderness, are we willing to care for our neighbors, seeking to not just quench thirst, but to find living waters that sustain us all? **Scripture:** John 4:5-42 | Exodus 17:1-7

### March 19 - 10 a.m. – Who Sinned?

When Jesus and the disciples encounter a blind man along the way, the disciples immediately ask, "Teacher, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?". They ask a poor question, filled with assumptions and harmful theology. Unfortunately, the crowd continues to interrogate

the man and dissect the miracle of his healing. This week, let us pay attention to the questions we ask. What assumptions do we carry? What is our intent? When seeking clarity or understanding, what are better questions we can ask? **Scripture:** John 9:1-7 | John 9:8-41

March 26 – 10 a.m. – Can These Bones Live? In Ezekiel's vision, God asks "Can these bones live?" Do we believe new life can come after death? Can we find hope when things are bleak? Can we really trust in God's resurrection? While we look to God to carry us through the valley, God looks to us to embody hope for others. As we prepare to enter Holy Week, we remember how Jesus began his final journey toward resurrection. As we walk through the valley of dry bones that leads us to Calvary Hill, let us seek out the hope that will stir in us and sustain us. **Scripture:** John 11:1-45 | Ezekiel 37:1-14

## April 2 – 10 a.m. – Palm/Passion Sunday: Where Are You Headed?

Imagine you are in Jerusalem when Jesus enters on a donkey. Within the chaos and commotion of that scene, where are you and which way will you go? Will you follow Jesus all the way to the cross? Jesus' willing surrender to his arrest should always catch us off-guard. As dismayed as the disciples, we ask, "Jesus, are you really headed this way, straight to your death?" Many of our weekly questions throughout the season so far have helped us prepare spiritually for Holy Week. Now we examine if our beliefs have changed our behaviors. Has your path changed? In the midst of opposing forces, which way will you go? **Scripture:** Matthew 21:1-11

## April 6 – 6:30 p.m. – Maundy Thursday: Will You Wash My Feet?

In his final night with his friends and followers, Jesus shows the fullness of his love by removing his robe, kneeling, and washing the disciples' feet. As he makes his way around the room, Jesus comes to Simon Peter who protests, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Like Peter, we may also question if God loves us and will care for us, even at the brink of death. In these final hours of accompanying Jesus to his grave, can we seek a posture of trust? Can we allow ourselves to be embraced and loved—by our neighbor and by God?

## April 9 – 10 a.m. – Easter: Who Are You Looking For?

Jesus, mysteriously appearing to Mary as the gardener, asks her: "Why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?" In the haze of grief, Mary can only see what is right before her—or in this case, what is not before her. It is only when Jesus calls her by name that the veil is lifted, and she beholds the resurrected Christ. On this Easter morning, who—or what—are you looking for? Why have you come to the tomb? What kind of Jesus are you looking for? What veils need to be lifted so we can recognize God's resurrection wherever it occurs?


## WELCOME TO OUR NEW MUSIC DIRECTOR!

This Lenten season, North Falmouth Congregational Church invites our neighbors and friends to join us in putting together health, hygiene kits. We will be collecting items to send to Church World Service for distribution throughout the world and here in the United States.

Collection boxes will be located throughout the church and on Sunday, April 16 the final collection box will be placed out in front of the church.

Thank you in advance for supporting this outreach mission project!

See the following list for needed items.

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
  - o Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth
  - No pocket combs or picks
  - Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable
- One fingernail or toenail clipper removed from the package (either one is acceptable)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the original package
- Ten standard size Band-Aids
- Wide-tooth Comb

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon Ziploc type bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing.

Do NOT add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each hygiene kit just prior to its final journey.
