Dear Friends,

It is hard not to smile and be joyful when spring comes to Cape Cod. Our eyes feast on the many colors of the season, the sun warms our faces, and the birds twitter away happily.

I was reminded last night, when talking to a dear friend, that sometimes God's glorious creation barely penetrates the dis-ease of depression. As I

listened to my friend share the agony of her life right now, she was doubly saddened that none of her friends had checked in to see how she was doing after telling them she was in crisis. It made her feel even more abandoned, unmoored, and unloved.

When a dear one is deeply depressed it can be hard to figure out how to be a good friend. We want to help, we want them to get better, we want to fix things, but we don't know how. We may show up with lots of advice in hand as to how they can get better. And if they don't listen to our "sage" advice, we give up. It might feel awkward to be around them because we are at a loss for words, and we don't know what to do. Or we may judge them and believe they should pull themselves up by their bootstraps and snap out of it.

Talking about depression and how we can help is a much longer conversation than there is space for here. Depression is a complex disease, but the best thing for those of us who are novices at being with someone struggling with depression is to just show up to let them know you care. Sometimes the greatest gift you can give is lending your ear so that they feel heard, loved, and known. It is no small thing to sit and listen. It does more than we can ever know. And after you've listened for a while, ask them what you can do that would be most helpful for them at this time, and then keep your promise.

It is through you that Jesus shows up to share the yoke with those who struggle. In putting on the yoke and sharing it, you just might lighten the many burdens the other person is carrying. You just might

help them find rest by being Christ's loving presence for them. We may be imperfect, we may not get things perfectly right, but truly, we are Christ's hands, feet, and heart in the world. Thanks be to God that we are—because it means that each one of us can bring God's healing, hope, and peace to those who are hurting. Amen to that!

Jewelry from Start to Finish

Many of you have no idea how much work is involved when a piece of jewelry is donated to our church or given to me, Laura Murphy.

In years past, there was an old jewelry box on the counter outside of the office, and people from the congregation would donate jewelry for our annual Christmas Fair. I started working with my mom, Ruth Willman, along with a few others in 1997. Back in 1997, when we had our fair, there were only two or three small tables in the hall. We only collected jewelry in the fall. My mom, Ruth passed away in 2000. I volunteered to continue working on jewelry in her memory. Many people help over the years, and without volunteers it would have been impossible to be so successful! Then I started receiving any jewelry donated to the Thrift Shop. Once jewelry donations came in, they were sorted. In one bag of jewelry, there was broken jewelry, only one earring, valuable sterling or gold, plastic jewels, and real costume jewelry. It takes hours to sort. The jewelry would be sorted into boxes, earrings, necklaces, pins, bracelets, rings, misc. and a box of "Save for Sue". Sue and Kate from the Stone Store would appraise the better jewelry, write down what type of stone, and verify gold or silver items. They even cleaned and polished many items. If there was an item that needed to be fixed, or more information was needed, Andrew at Elfstone in Mashpee Commons was there to help. Both businesses volunteered their time and knowledge as a gift to our church. Many hours were spent. Then each piece needed a string tag attached for pricing, earrings and pins were put on individual cards for display, again very time consuming. It has been a true labor of love, which in the end brought in great totals for the church.

I have been working with jewelry for 26 years. It is time to pass on the responsibility of jewelry to another passionate person. We are looking for some people from the congregation to devote time sorting, pricing, and appraising our donations. You do not have to work at the Thrift Shop, but be able to spend time with others to organize the jewelry. We have one person from the Thrift Shop

interested, but a committee is needed to make this job run smoothly. It can be a very social and fun job, while providing help to the church. Some of the work can be done at home when you have some leisure time. I have told Sue, Kate and Andrew, the amazing people who have helped appraise, that I am stepping down. They supported my decision, and they have decided to step down as well after all these years. Please support both of these businesses. Stone Store on 28A in West Falmouth, and Elfstone in Mashpee Commons. I would never have been able to make so much money without their help. Please tell them Laura sent you, and thank them for their years of volunteering.

Change is good, and I know there are people in the congregation who will enjoy this job. Many hands make light work, and it really does help the church financially! I have enjoyed all these years, and I will be there to answer any questions and support our new volunteers.

Thank you so much to ALL the volunteers who have helped over the 26 years I was involved. I could not have done this without you. There are too many people to list, but you know who you are! This has been a team effort, and I hope you had as much fun as I have had over the years.
