Dear Friends,

I've been thinking a lot about our church lately and what came to mind was the size of our church. There is no getting around the fact that we are a small church (and I don't mean the size of the building). We often think being small is a deficit. If we were bigger that would be the measure of our success, right? But by whose measuring stick are we defining success—society's or God's?

This all made me think of the children's book, *The Little Engine That Could*. This story in various forms has been circulating for over 100 years. The story's signature phrase, "I think I can" appeared in a Swedish journal in 1902. An early version, "Story of the Engine That Thought It Could", appeared in the *New York Tribune* in 1906 as part of a sermon

by Rev. Charles S. Wing. The 1930 version, by Watty Piper, was updated in 1954 with illustrations.

The enduring message of *The Little Engine That Could*, "I think I can, I think I can, I think I can" says, "Yeah, there may be bigger trains out there, but I can do this. I don't have to give up or lose hope just because I am small." And the train wasn't doing something for itself—it was doing something for others. The train's selflessness powered it over the mountain. Obviously, Rev. Wing thought the message of determination powered by selflessness was important enough to preach to his congregation.

This is what it really comes down to for any church, large or small, doing God's work with determination powered by selflessness. God doesn't care about size. God knows small churches can do the mighty work of Christ. Just because we are small doesn't mean we can't make a difference in each other's lives, our neighbor's lives, and our own lives. It doesn't mean we can't celebrate God's grace, goodness, and joy in our lives in big ways and share that abundance with others.

My friends, you offer so much—this is an amazing church with a huge heart filled with Christ-like love. We may be small, but we can make a big difference in the world. We may be small, but we can share God's love in big ways. I know you can because you do already!
