

CHRISMONS...... Once again this year, the Altar Committee decorated the sanctuary for Advent and the Christmas season. The white and gold ornaments on the tree and the wreath are called Chrismons. They were handmade by the ladies of our church back in the 1980's. The original Chrismons

were developed in 1957 at a Lutheran church in Virginia as a decoration appropriate for the church Christmas tree as opposed to the colored lights and secular symbols being used at that time. The Chrismons are Christian symbols made in white with gold decorations. "Chrismons cannot be bought or sold; they can only be made to give in love and in celebration of Christ's birth." The NFCC is truly fortunate to have these beautiful symbols of the true Christmas decorating our sanctuary.

For those of you who have yet to turn in your pledge card, we ask that you turn it in at your earliest convenience. It is very important that we have a good idea of the amount of donations we can expect for the coming year so we can properly establish our budget for the year.



2022 Giving Envelopes

The 2022 giving envelopes will be available by the first of the year. This year, the 2022 envelopes will be different. Each box of envelopes will have 53 envelopes as in the past. However, the envelopes will not be numbered. This is being done because the number of church members who use envelopes is now fewer than 50. Prior to this we purchased 100 boxes of numbered envelopes. There are several reasons for this change: members send in their donations directly from their bank once a month; members mail in the donations once a monthly; members drop off their donations at Sunday services once a month; and members donate without using their box of numbered envelopes.

If you want to continue to use a box of envelopes during the coming year they will be available in front of the Church office soon. If your donation is in the form of check you do not need to put your name or envelope number on the front of the envelope. (Note: each member will retain the currently assigned envelope number.) If your donation is in the form of cash, you will need to put your name and/or assigned envelope number on the front of the envelope so we can properly account for your donation.
