# **Pastoral Page**

"So then, if anyone is in Christ, that person is part of the new creation. The old things have gone away, and look, new things have arrived!" 2 Corinthians 5:17

Dear Friends,

In her book, *The Great Emergence*, author and religion professor Phyllis Tickle describes how the Church cleans house every 500 years by holding a giant rummage sale to decide what to dispose of and what to keep in order to make room for new things.

The first rummage sale happened when "God with us" appeared in Jesus. 500 years later, when the Roman Empire collapsed and Europe plunged into the Dark Ages, the Church withdrew behind the cloistered walls of monasteries and convents. 500 years later, the Great Schism caused the church to split doctrinally between the East and the West. About 500 years ago, Martin Luther kicked off the Great Reformation as people came to understand God in new ways through direct prayer and individual interpretation of the Bible.

Well... here we are 500 years later. Is the Church having another rummage sale? Church experts say "yes". The Church has changed before our very eyes during our lifetimes. The Church used to be the center of people's lives, but for many that is no longer true.

Tickle says we are entering a new era of "The Emergent Church," a religious movement that crosses denominational boundaries, seeks common ground, engages diverse cultures, embraces social causes as ways to live out Christ's call to serve

others, and takes place largely outside the church building. Is this the church of the future? Research is starting to reveal that churches who focus more of their time and talent outside their walls are more vital and vibrant in their communities.

Change is hard. We love our church—its people, its traditions, and yes, its building. And yet, we know that God's call to us is bigger than North Falmouth Congregational Church, bigger than the UCC, and bigger even than the church universal. The most basic message of Christianity is one of resurrection and renewal.

So, what do we do now? Dream!

While most everything is on hold during the pandemic, we have the perfect opportunity to dream about who we can be and what we will do as a beloved community when we open up again. On pages 8-10 of this newsletter you will find a survey to help you dream about our future. Rummage sales are always a good time to look at what to keep and what to pass on in order to make room for something new.

So, my friends, let us go boldly and faithfully and dream about where God is leading us during this time that is so full possibilities. God is doing a new thing! Now it is springing up, do you not perceive it?


#### **UPCOMING WORSHIP – FEBRUARY**

Creativity as a big part of our spiritual lives and God invites us to be co-creators in making a better world for all. We'll continue the creative series through February 14.

**February 7** – Fifth Sunday of Epiphany – God's Creative Process: Fifth Step–Re-Integrate Everything that is created is in relationship with all other things. This is God's will. Nothing exists in isolation. What happens for humanity is closely related to how we respond to each other. **Scripture:** 1 Corinthians 12:12-19

February 14 – Sixth Sunday of Epiphany – God's Creative Process: Sixth Step–Rest Something overlooked in the creative process is the place of effortlessness and play. In the story of creation, God rested—and this was good and well. Being productive and focused in every moment robs us of the rhythm of life God wants for us. When God rested, it was to pause to reflect, observe, and celebrate. Scripture: Exodus 20:8-11



For Lent, we begin a new worship series for this pandemic time, Holy Vessels: A Lenten Season of Recovery. Each of us is a precious and holy vessel of God's embodied love. We have been through a

harrowing time since last Lent. For many of us, it has shattered our sense of wholeness in body, mind, and spirit—much like a glass vessel fractured into pieces. In this Lenten "season of recovery" for our physical, communal, mental, intellectual, and environmental health, we will explore the healing narratives of Jesus that shows us God's solidarity with human suffering and remind us that we can begin a journey toward making something beautiful from that which is seemingly broken. Beach glass offers us multifaceted symbol of transformative process.

# **February 17** – Ash Wednesday –

Shattered 7 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is a time of naming brokenness. As we enter the season of Lent, we also commit to enter into a season of healing and recovery and name first what has been shattered. We take "the yoke" of responsibility as disciples of Jesus to be the Body of Christ—a body of those who need healing and offer healing to others. The promise of Jesus is that he is with us in our weariness and burdens. **Scripture:** Matthew 11:28-30

# **February 21** – First Sunday of Lent –

Treasure – Physical Health

Beach glass begins as something whole and discarded. As it is tumbled by the sea, it is broken and polished until it becomes a treasured "mineral gem." We do not embrace that suffering as necessary or God-given, but that suffering is a part of life. When pain and brokenness enter our lives, Jesus reaches out to remind us of the treasure that we all are—worthy of new life in the midst of hopelessness. **Scripture:** Matthew 8:1-4, 14-18

# **February 28** – Second Sunday of Lent – Safe Keeping – Community Health

God gathers us as a beachcomber gathers and marvels at every precious surviving piece of beach glass that is found. We are never alone. We are never lost to the One who seeks humanity's wholeness. We affirm our commitment to be the Body of Christ that knows we cannot be personally healed until we see the interconnectedness of community as part of the process of healing. Jesus reimages the family of God in which false boundaries are overcome. **Scripture:** Matthew 8:5-13


